Invitation to apply for Northumberland Park Partnership Board Resident Funding Programmes

Dear Applicant,

I am pleased to share the Northumberland Park Partnership Board Resident Funding Programme application process with you.

Our resident-led partnership board was set up in February 2016 with the aim of bringing together partners – residents, voluntary and community, public and private sectors to co-deliver better outcomes for the Northumberland Park ward.

The Northumberland Park Partnership Board (NPPB) wishes to work with the community and partners to fund initiatives which will enable and empower our residents and partners to connect with opportunities to improve their lives.

To support this objective, we have a total of £210,000 available from two funding programmes: £180,000 is from the Department for Culture and Local Government (DCLG) Transformation Challenge Award Grant and £30,000 is from Well Communities. All of the funding available will benefit residents of the Northumberland Park ward.

The funds need to be allocated to successful applicants by end of March 2017 and projects need to be delivered within a 12months period.

Our funding streams will be split into 3 key areas:

1. Large Grants: Between £10,000 – £40,000 can be awarded per project
2. Small Grants:
 - i. Between £500 - £3,000 per project for Priority 2¹
 - ii. Between £1,000 to £5,000 per project for all other Priority areas
3. Seedling Grants: Between £1000 – £5,000. This funding strand is specifically for those **individuals** able to work with a voluntary and community sponsoring organisation willing and able to support their idea.

¹ All successful applicants for Priority 2 will be eligible for additional support and capability development grant (please see Annex 1 for further details).

Our funding priorities

There are five funding priority areas as indicated below and applicants are asked to apply against one or more of these as appropriate:

1. Outstanding for all:

Priority 1: Enable every child and young person to have the best start in life, with high quality education

Priority 2: Enable all adults to live healthy, long and fulfilling lives

2. Clean and Safe:

Priority 3: A clean, well maintained and safe borough where people are proud to live and work

3. Sustainable Housing, Growth and Employment:

Priority 4: Drive growth and employment from which everyone can benefit

Priority 5: Create homes and communities where people choose to live and are able to thrive

You will find more detailed information on how to apply in the accompanying guidance notes. If you are applying for Priority 2 (Well Communities) - the Health-related priority - please ensure you refer to Annex 1 of the Guidance.

The deadlines for the funding streams are indicated within the guidance. Please ensure you read the guidance thoroughly before starting your application.

We have appointed The Selby Trust to administer monitor and evaluate our grant funds. All applications will need to be sent to them at the address indicated within the guidance.

I would like to thank Haringey Council, our partners and all our Board members for the time, enthusiasm and commitment to this project. I am confident that together we will be able to work for and with all the local communities to make a great difference. We look forward to receiving your grant funding proposals and ideas.
